# Welcome to our 2018 Foundation Classes

We are very excited to welcome our new families to Warragul North Primary School and in particular our Foundation classes who are commencing their primary school education.

The Foundation children had a wonderful first day of school. We remind parents that Foundation children will not attend school on Wednesdays until Wednesday 14th March, 2018.













At Warragul North Primary School we strongly encourage punctuality and attendance. At 8.50am the 'bag bell' sounds and children hang their

and attendance. At 8.50am the 'bag bell' sounds and children hang their bags up and enter their classrooms ready for a 9.00am start. We also know the importance of regular attendance and follow the 'It's not ok to be away or late' process. Students who attend every school day for Term One will receive a 100% attendance certificate. The same will happen if they attend every school day for Terms Two, Three and Four.

At the end of the year any student who achieves a rate of 100% for the year will be acknowledged.

A special attendance award was presented to Violette (pictured left) for her outstanding attendance over the past seven years at Warragul North Primary School. ## School Supplies 2018

Included in this newsletter are the details of the school costs for 2018.

Statements will be posted out to all families at the beginning of 2018 with payment due as soon as possible. Families wishing to pay in two instalments should pay the first instalment by the end of February and the second instalment by the end of Term Two.

Payment can be made in person at the school office, by sending the payment in a named envelope with your child or online using internet banking. Our bank details are: BSB 313-140 ACCOUNT NO. 12012190.

Families who are in receipt of a Centrelink payment (e.g. Family Tax Benefit, Parenting Payment, etc) are able to set up a Centrepay facility to pay their school account in fortnightly instalments. Please call at the school office for further information or to set up Centrepay.

### WARRAGUL NORTH PRIMARY SCHOOL SCHOOL COSTS 2018:

The school charges for the 2018 year as set by School Council are as follows:

#### \$195.00 (PER STUDENT FOUNDATION) \$185.00 (PER STUDENT YEARS 1 - 6)

To ensure all WNPS students have the stationery supplies needed for the academic year the Warragul North School Council makes a bulk purchase from reputable suppliers on behalf of parents. This



ensures parents are able to purchase their child's supplies very cost effectively and easily. The bulk purchase also means all students have the same supplies (e.g. pencils, pens, rulers, paper, paint, glue, etc). This cost also includes materials and equipment for Visual Arts, Performing Arts and Physical Education. On the school account statement that parents receive the student supplies are charged as 'Essential Education Items' as per the Department of Education guidelines.

#### MATHS ONLINE \$20.00 (PER STUDENT FOUNDATION - YEAR 6)

Maths Online is an educational website catering for Kindergarten through to Year 12. Maths Online enables children to use tutorials to learn and revise a large range of topics. It has a comprehensive Australian K - 12 curriculum with 1,411 animated and narrated mathematics lessons, a bank of tests and instant feedback to students. Once payment has been made a personal password is issued allowing access 24 hours, seven days a week.

#### WUSHKA ONLINE \$20.00 (PER STUDENT FOUNDATION - YEAR 6)

Wushka is an online levelled school reading program which helps students learn to read and includes an extensive selection of fiction and non-fiction levelled school readers. Every levelled reader has an online comprehension quiz and printable teacher support material. Teachers manage their own class, easily setting class reading levels, reading groups and choosing readers to read at home. Once payment has been made a personal password is issued allowing access 24 hours, seven days a week.

#### HEADPHONES \$20.00 (PER STUDENT FOUNDATION - YEAR 6)

For use in classrooms with laptops, i-Pads, i-Pods and audio equipment. Students will use the headphones during Digital Technology lessons. Headphones are to be retained from year to year.



#### MEMORY STICK \$20.00 (PER STUDENT YEARS 3 - 6)

For use at school and home to enable students to store their school work. These are supplied with a Warragul North Primary School lanyard. Memory sticks are to be retained from year to year.

#### GROUNDS MAINTENANCE CHARGE \$35.00 (PER FAMILY)

Parents are keen to see the school's buildings and grounds properly maintained in order to provide their children with a clean, tidy and safe learning environment. To assist in achieving this goal payment of the grounds maintenance charge will allow the school to engage paid labour.



#### WORKING BEE \$60.00 (PER FAMILY)

The Buildings and Grounds sub-committee of School Council hold a minimum of two working bees each year. At Warragul North Primary School we recognise that parents cannot always be available on these days. The working bee charge enables families to contribute in lieu of attendance.

#### 'FOR THE RECORD' SCHOOL YEARBOOK \$30.00 (PER FAMILY)

The school yearbook is issued at the end of the year to the eldest child in each family. It is a fantastic record of the Warragul North Primary School year and includes photos of the many activities the children take part in during the year such as concerts, production, camps and excursions.



# Hello from the Acorn Room



My name is Sheryn Cutler, and this is my second year as the chaplain here at Warragul North Primary School. I live just outside Warragul on our family dairy farm with my husband, Pete, and children, Jim (8 years) and Lilly (6 years). My background is as a Secondary School Teacher in the Wimmera,

but in more recent years I have been working as a Pilates instructor, led Warragul 'mainly music' playgroup as well as regularly helping out on the farm. I have loved working with staff, students and families at Warragul North Primary School last year and feel so privileged to share with people the highs and lows as we each journey through the challenges and joys life brings. I want to warmly welcome everyone back to school this year, particularly any new students and families. I hope you are all able to settle in and feel part of this wonderful school community.

The chaplaincy program at Warragul North Primary School has a strong history and is an integral part of the school's welfare program. This year, we are particularly fortunate to have a number of different professionals working in the school in the area of student welfare and wellbeing.

The term 'chaplain' can be a little confusing as it implies some form of religious role. As part of the National School Chaplaincy Programme (NSCP) which this chaplaincy program is funded by, chaplains working in government schools must be of a recognised faith. In my case, I am a Christian and attend the Warragul Anglican Church. However, the role I play in the school is not religious in nature, but one of general pastoral care for students and staff at the school as well as their families.

I am able to meet with students one on one during class time for personal sessions (after obtaining parental consent and in consultation with the classroom teacher) and also run lunchtime activities for small groups on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Students can be referred to see me by staff at the school, by parents/guardians/carers or students can request to see me themselves via a box under the notice board at the school office.

# Term One Topics

#### Foundation - My Life, My Place

- Sequence significant events about personal and family history to create a chronological narrative.
- Describe and explain where places and activities are located.
- Collect and record geographical data and information.

### Year One – Celebrations around the World

- How they and their family celebrate past events that are important to them.
- Places and our connections to them. Representation
  of the location of places and their features on maps
  and models, including a globe and the location of the
  major geographical divisions of the world in relation to
  Australia.

#### Year Two - Olden Days

- Identify perspectives about changes to daily life from people in the past or present.
- How the present, past and future are signified by terms indicating and describing time.
- Differences and similarities between students' daily lives and perspectives of life during their parents' and grandparents' childhoods, including family traditions, leisure time and communications.
- The effect of changing technology on people's lives and their perspectives on the significance of that change.

#### Year Three - Indigenous Studies

- The significance of Country and Place to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples who belong to a local area.
- One significant narrative, myth or celebration from the past.
- The diversity and longevity of Australia's first peoples and the significant ways Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples are connected to Country and Place (land, sea, waterways and skies) and the effects on their daily lives.
- Similarities and differences in individuals' and groups' feelings and perceptions about places and how they influence views about the protection of these places.

#### Year Four - Science in Action

- A change of state between solid and liquid can be caused by adding or removing heat.
- Natural and processed materials have a range of physical properties; these properties can influence their use.
- Heat can be produced in many ways and can move from one object to another; a change in the temperature of an object is related to the gain or loss of heat by the object.
- Forces can be exerted by one object on another through direct contact or from a distance.

#### Year Five - Natural Disasters

- Sudden geological changes or extreme weather conditions can affect Earth's surface.
- Interpret maps and other geographical data and information using digital and spatial technologies as appropriate to develop identifications, descriptions, explanations and conclusions that use geographical terminology.
- Location of the major countries of Europe and North America in relation to natural disasters.
- Impacts of bushfires or floods on environments and communities and how people can respond.

#### Year Six – Antarctica

- Scientific understandings, discoveries and inventions are used to inform personal and community decisions and to solve problems that directly affect people's lives.
- Living things have structural features and adaptions that help them to survive in their environment.
- The growth and survival of living things are affected by the physical conditions of their environment.
- Interpret maps and other geographical data and information using digital and spatial technologies as appropriate to develop identifications, descriptions, explanations and conclusions that use geographical terminology.

### FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

#### CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF will be provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students.

# Community News



Starting school is not only a change for your child. Amid the excitement and preparation it can be important to take a moment to think about how this change affects you and your family.

As you help your child to prepare for the changes ahead, it is important to monitor your own feelings. Having your child start school may lead to a new routine for you and your family. There may also be a period of adjustment as you begin to connect with the new school community and feel the loss of strong relationships formed at your child's early childhood education and care (ECEC) service. Thinking a little about how things are going to change for everyone can help you to make sure the whole family is ready for starting school.
