Principal's Report

Same Day Notification of Unexplained Student Absences

Overview:

The new School Attendance Guidelines specify that from the end of Term Two government schools must contact parents/carers as soon as practicable on the day of an unexplained student absence.

Protecting the safety and well-being of children through the reporting and monitoring of absenteeism is the responsibility of both parents/ carers and schools. Parents/carers have an obligation to notify the school of their child's absence and schools are required to notify parents/ carers on the day of an unexplained student absence. This responsibility needs to be underpinned by shared understanding and expectations about the procedures for the promotion, monitoring and follow-up of student attendance.

Clear communication and building a positive and collaborative relationship between schools and parents is critical to the successful implementation of same day notifications. In addition, in order to implement this requirement, it is essential that schools have accurate and current parent/carer contact details.

Maintaining contact details:

- There are times when we will need to contact you, including on the day if your child is absent and you haven't informed the school as to why.
- Do we have your most up to date contact details?
- If not please contact the school via e-mail warragul.north.ps@ edumail.vic.gov.au or phone on 56234066 so we can update our records.
- Please include parent/carers' name, address, phone numbers, e-mail address and emergency contact details.
- Please remember to contact the school if any of these details or circumstances change.



As a Parent Are You Paying Your Fair Share - \$3.56 a week?

Have you paid the \$185 for your child's 2018 supplies?

Recently I became aware that some parents of students attending Warragul North Primary School do not understand why they need to pay any costs. So using information recently published by the Department of Education and Training I will explain parent payment.

What does the legislation say?

The Education and Training Reform Act (2006) provides for free instruction in the standard curriculum program to all students in government schools. The Act also empowers school councils to charge parents for goods and services provided by the school to a child.

What is free instruction?

Free instruction is the teaching staff, administration and the provision of facilities in connection with the instruction of the standard curriculum program. The standard curriculum for Years F – 10 means implementation of the Victorian Curriculum F – 10.

What are parents asked to pay for?

Essential Student Learning Items

These are items, activities or services that the school deems essential to student learning of the standard curriculum. These may also be either:

Items the student takes temporary or permanent possession of e.g.

- Textbooks, activity books, exercise books
- Stationery, book bags
- Cooking ingredients students will consume
- Materials for final products that students take home (technology projects, build-your-own kits, dioramas)
- Communications Systems

Activities associated with instruction that all students are expected to attend i.e.

- Travel, entry fees or accommodation e.g.
 - Excursions
 - Incursions
 - School sports
 - Work placements

Optional Items

These are items, activities or services that are optional and are offered in addition to the standard curriculum. Students may access these on a user-pays basis. These may be either: Items the student purchases or hires e.g.

- School magazines, class photos
- Functions, formals, graduation dinners
- Materials for extracurricular programs
- Student accident insurance

Activities the student purchases e.g.

- Fees for extracurricular programs or activities, such as instrumental music tuition
- Fees for guest speakers
- Camps, excursions, incursions, sports
- Entry fees for school run performances

How can parents pay for their child's essential learning items?

The Warragul North Primary School Council for many years has used the process of purchasing essential items on behalf of parents in bulk so every child has the same items at the same time. This enables a smooth start to the year with every child having equal access to learning activities from the first day of the school year. No child feels left out.

The 2018 Warragul North Primary School charge of \$185.00 for Years 1 – 6 materials and supplies (i.e. essential student learning items) equates to approximately \$3.56 per week over the year. For Foundation students the charge of \$195.00 equates to approximately \$3.75 per week over the year.

Payment for essential learning items can be paid

- 1. full year
- 2. 1/2 yearly (semester one and semester two)
- 3. Instalments
- 4. Centrepay (regular deduction from Centrelink payment)

Warragul North Primary School provides these payment options to assist parents choose the option that best suits them.

Thank you to the parents who have supported their child's learning by paying for their child's learning items.

If you previously did not know or understand that as a parent of a child attending a government school you need to pay for your child's essential learning items I hope this explanation has clarified the situation for you. Please be fair and pay your share. If parents support our current parent payment process School Council can continue to buy in bulk which is economical and convenient. This process also supports all children as learners feel good about themselves as they receive the same items at the same time.

Changing to a different process will be more expensive and less convenient for parents. Our current system will only continue to work successfully if parents contribute to their child's education. Please help us help you.

Student achievement involves the combination of a number of elements in the learning process such as setting goals, understanding the learning intent, thinking, developing skills, feedback, reflecting and exerting effort to achieve. Each student needs to understand that they are the learner and that they are responsible for their own learning.

Teachers can support students to continuously refine and improve their learning and understanding. Teachers can assist students to set learning goals and understand learning intentions. Teachers can then use evidence (what the student can do, say, make or write) to provide feedback and assist students to evaluate their progress, that is their achievements. Teachers can support students to reflect on their learning and the impact of effort on achievement.

Learning requires students to engage in a thinking process and exert effort to achieve. Students striving for excellence can achieve to their potential. Achievement requires effort by learners as they engage in the learning process.

In a 'nutshell' Achievement means accomplishing your learning goals using effort and skill.

ATTITUDES TO SCHOOL SURVEY 2018 We want our students to tell us what they think!

The Attitudes to School survey is an annual student survey offered by the Department of Education and Training to assist schools in gaining an understanding of students' perceptions and experience of school. Our school will use the survey results to plan programs and activities to improve your child's schooling experience.

The Department has updated the survey for 2018 to include important new measures that are known to influence student engagement and performance. Students from Year Four, Year Five and Year Six at our school will participate in the survey. Your child will complete the survey online during school hours using a purpose built secure online survey tool. It is important to note that we are not in any way 'testing' your child.

Your child will be provided with a unique login to complete the survey. The student login is an assigned identifier that may be used by the Department to link data for statistical and research purposes only. Your child's privacy and the confidentiality of your child's survey responses will be protected at all times. No identifiable personal data is included in the survey response file.

The survey results will be reported back to the school in Term Three. No student can be identified in the results reported to schools or in any other report of the data.

This year the Attitudes to School survey will be conducted across the state over the period Monday 23rd April to Friday 1st June. The survey takes about 20 minutes to complete and occurs during your child's class time.

I've recently been learning about emotion coaching in the context of parenting (but it's applicable to anyone who works with children). It's about helping children develop emotional intelligence – how to understanding their own feelings, and therefore manage these feelings themselves in order to

make healthy behavioural choices. It's different to just managing children's behaviour, which we so often slip into, especially as we are generally so time poor. The underlying philosophy is that all emotions are acceptable, but not all behaviours are acceptable. What we can do as adults who work with children, is recognise when a child is heading towards problematic behaviour, an explosion or meltdown. Before they have 'flipped their lids', take this learning opportunity. Help the child to identify what they are feeling by naming the emotion and describing how it feels. Perhaps even exploring why they are experiencing this emotion. Then together decide what to do about it. The goal is to do this 30% of the time in order to raise emotionally intelligent kids.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF will be provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students.






Artists of the Week
