YEAR THREE & FIVE NAPLAN INDIVIDUAL STUDNET REPORTS AVAILABLE



During May students in Years Three and Five participated in the nationwide National Assessment Program for Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN). Your child's individual NAPLAN results are available for collection from the school office.

Parents of children in Year Five are reminded that secondary schools may request a copy of your child's Year Five NAPLAN results. It is suggested that you file these results in a safe place for future use. An administration fee will be charged if another copy of your child's NAPLAN results is requested.

SAME DAY NOTIFICATION OF UNEXPLAINED STUDENT ABSENCES

Overview:

The new School Attendance Guidelines specify that from the end of Term Two government schools must contact parents/carers as soon as practicable on the day of an unexplained student absence.

Protecting the safety and well-being of children through the reporting and monitoring of absenteeism is the responsibility of both parents/carers and schools. Parents/carers have an obligation to notify the school of their child's absence and schools are required to notify parents/carers on the day of an unexplained student absence. This responsibility needs to be underpinned by shared understanding and expectations about the procedures for the promotion, monitoring and follow-up of student attendance.

Clear communication and building a positive and collaborative relationship between schools and parents is critical to the successful implementation of same day notifications. In addition, in order to implement this requirement, it is essential that schools have accurate and current parent/carer contact details.

Notify the school of your child's absence:

- Protecting the safety and well-being of children through the reporting and monitoring of absenteeism is the responsibility of both parents / carers and schools.
- Please remember to text the school's absence reporting line on 0447 503 536 by 11.00am if your child is going to be away or late for school so your child's absence can be recorded correctly.

Same-day notification of unexplained student absences:

- Our school will text you by midday on the day if a student is not at school and you haven't notified the school as to why.
- If you are notified by the school that your child is away without a reason, please reply to the text as soon as possible to let us know why your child is absent.
- If we cannot reach you because we don't have your correct contact details (i.e. disconnected number, message notification fail) then we will make contact with your emergency contacts held by the school.

A friendly reminder: Please remember it is your responsibility to contact us to provide an explanation for your child's absence from school, and where possible, please inform us in advance of upcoming absences.

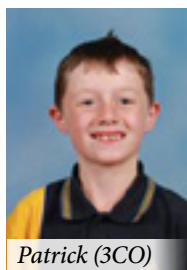

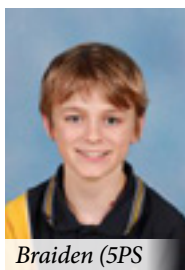

Hello from the *Acorn Room*



With Father's Day just recently come and gone, I thought this a good opportunity to recognize the wonderful work many fathers do in raising children, and provide some tips on how to make the most of this precious and unique role of fatherhood. Steve Biddulph describes the fatherhood revolution as being one of

the most positive developments of the past 30 years. Where once fathers were assumed to be hands off in the work of raising children, these days dads are welcomed and encouraged to get involved in all aspects of their children's lives.

Children learn about love by watching and observing. Men being respectful of their partners is so important. Children need to see that a man can argue calmly, that he can listen and make his point without fighting or lashing out. Dads who show care in expressing their feelings around their children, teach them that it is possible to feel afraid, but not rattled, mad, but not dangerous, happy, but not stupid and sad, but not overwhelmed. Dads play-wrestling with kids is a wonderful opportunity for kids to practice controlling their emotions, and to enjoy physical closeness with dad. From the age of about six to fourteen, boys particularly start to increasingly look to their dads to learn to be happy and secure in their maleness. It's important that fathers of boys in this age group are not over busy with work or absent themselves physically or emotionally from the family. Biddulph describes dads as the

'self-esteem' department for daughters. Spending time together, paying her compliments and being interested in her life can have amazing effects.

For thousands of years, single mothers have needed to raise children without a man in the house. Good male role models, such as family members, good friends, schoolteachers and sports coaches are invaluable. Whatever happens in your own marriage/relationship, it's important that fathers don't 'divorce their kids'. If you are a dad and you know kids who don't have a dad present or whose dad is not very involved, think about including such children in activities with your own kids.

Some aspects of being a great dad may come naturally, and some may take more deliberate effort. Please know, dads (and father-figures), that you have an important role to play in raising the next generation. Well done and keep up the great work.

Treating and controlling headlice

health

While children are at school many families will have contact with head lice. The information contained here will help you treat and control head lice.

Catching head lice

Head lice have been around for many thousands of years. Anyone can get head lice.

Head lice are small, wingless, blood sucking insects. Their colour varies from whitish-brown to reddish-brown. Head lice only survive on humans. If isolated from the head they die very quickly (usually within 24 hours).

People get head lice from direct hair to hair contact with another person who has head lice. This can happen when people play, cuddle or work closely together.

Head lice do not have wings or jumping legs so they cannot fly or jump from head to head. They can only crawl.

Finding head lice

Many lice do not cause an itch, so you have to **look carefully to find them**.

Head lice are found on the hair itself and move to the scalp to feed. They have six legs which end in a claw and they rarely fall from the head. Louse eggs (also called nits) are laid within 1.5 cm of the scalp and are firmly attached to the hair. They resemble dandruff, but can't be brushed off.

Lice can crawl and hide. The easiest and most effective way to find them is to follow these steps:

- Step 1** Comb any type of hair conditioner on to dry, brushed (detangled) hair. This stuns the lice and makes it difficult for them to grip the hair or crawl around.
- Step 2** Now comb sections of the hair with a fine tooth, head lice comb.
- Step 3** Wipe the conditioner from the comb onto a paper towel or tissue.
- Step 4** Look on the tissue and on the comb for lice and eggs.
- Step 5** Repeat the combing for every part of the head at least four or five times.

If lice or eggs are found, the hair should be treated.

If the person has been treated recently and you only find empty hatched eggs, you may not have to treat, as the empty eggs could be from a previous episode.

Treating head lice

Treating head lice involves removing lice and eggs from the hair. There are two ways you can do this:

1. Buying and using a head lice lotion or shampoo, following the instructions on the product
2. Using the conditioner and comb method (described under 'finding head lice') every second day until there have been no live lice found for ten days.

If you choose to use a head lice product always read and follow the instructions provided with the product carefully. The following points may also be helpful:

- Head lice products must be applied to all parts of the hair and scalp.
- No treatment kills all of the eggs so treatment must involve two applications, seven days apart. The first treatment kills all lice; the second treatment kills the lice that may have hatched from eggs not killed by the first treatment.
- Cover the person's eyes while the treatment is being applied. A towel is a good way to do this.
- If you are using a lotion, apply the product to dry hair.
- If you are using a shampoo, wet the hair, but use the least amount of water possible.
- Apply the treatment near the scalp, using an ordinary comb to cover the hair from root to tip. Repeat this several times until all the hair is covered.

There is no need to treat the whole family - unless they also have head lice.

Concentrate on the head - there is no need to clean the house or the classroom.

Only the pillowcase requires washing - either wash it in hot water (at least 60°C) or dry it using a clothes dryer on the hot or warm setting.

Chesterfield Farm Excursion

They were greeted by sheep, cows, pigs and chickens and saw a huge range of different farm animals. Highlights of the day included a tractor ride around the farm, milking a cow, and watching a sheepdog and the shearing presentation. The Foundation students were able to feed the farm animals and cuddle the baby animals in the nursery while learning about why we have farms. The weather was perfect and all the children had a fantastic day at the farm!

Voting runs until 17th Sept. but the sooner your vote is in the better

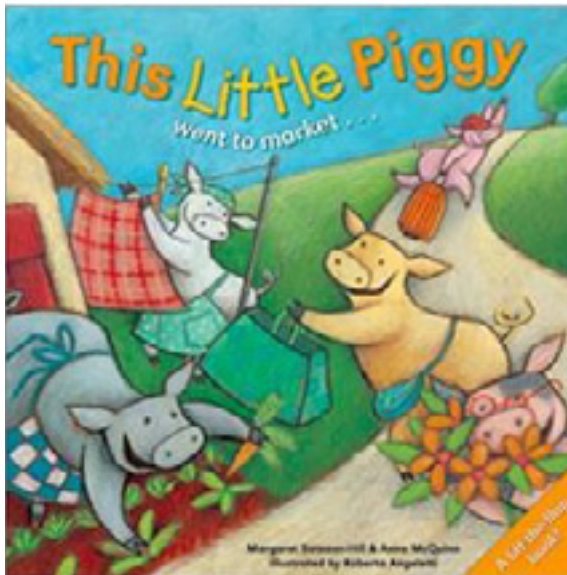
