

### **ANAPHYLAXIS MANAGEMENT**



As part of Warragul North Primary School's commitment to the safety of all our students, meeting legislative requirements and advice

from the Anaphylaxis Advisory Service of the Royal Children's Hospital, parents/carers of students diagnosed with anaphylaxis are reminded of the importance of:

- Keeping the school informed of any changes to your child's medical condition.
- Ensuring the school has the correct and in date medication for your child.
- Reviewing your child's ASCIA Action Plan annually (or after an allergic reaction) with your medical practitioner, and providing the school with the new plan.

# WNPS Volunteers Policy

### **PURPOSE**

To outline the processes that Warragul North Primary school will follow to recruit, screen, supervise and manage volunteers to provide a child safe environment, and to explain the legal rights of volunteers.

# **DEFINITIONS**

Child-related work: work that usually involves direct contact (including in person, over the phone, written and online communication) with a child that is a central part of that person's duties. It does not include work that involves occasional contact with children that is incidental to the work.

Closely related family member: parent, carer, parent/carer's spouse or domestic partner, stepparent, parent/carer's mother or father in-law, grandparent, uncle or aunt, brother or sister, including step or half siblings.

*Volunteer worker:* A volunteer school worker is a person who voluntarily engages in school work or approved community work without payment or reward.

School work: School work means:

- Carrying out the functions of a school council
- Any activity carried out for the welfare of a school, by the school council, any parents' club or association or any other body organised to promote the welfare of the school
- Any activity carried out for the welfare of the school at the request of the principal or school council
- Providing assistance in the work of any school or kindergarten
- Attending meetings in relation to government schools convened by any organisation which receives government financial support

This is a broad definition and means that volunteers who participate in school community activities, such as fundraising and assisting with excursions, are legally protected (ie indemnified) from action by others in the event of an injury or accident whilst they are performing volunteer school work in good faith.

### **POLICY**

Warragul North Primary School is committed to implementing and following practices which protect the safety and wellbeing of children and our staff and volunteers. The procedures set out in this policy are designed to ensure that Warragul North Primary School's volunteers are suitable to work with children and are well-placed to make a positive contribution to our school community.

# Working with students

Warragul North Primary School values the many volunteers that assist in our classrooms/with sports events/camps/excursions/school concerts/other events and programs. To ensure that we are meeting our legal obligations under the *Working With Children Act 2005* (Vic) and the Child Safe Standards, Warragul North Primary School is required to undertake suitability checks which may include a Working With Children Check, proof of identity, work history involving children and/or reference checks.

Considering our legal obligations, and our commitment to ensuring that Warragul North Primary School is a child safe environment, we will require volunteers to hold a current WWC Check and have a copy of their valid card recorded by administration staff for verification in the following circumstances:

- Volunteers who are not parent/family members
   of any student at the school are required to have a
   WWC Check if they are engaged in child-related
   work regardless of whether they are being supervised.
- Parent/family volunteers who are assisting with any classroom or school activities involving direct contact with children in circumstances where the volunteer's child is not participating, or does not ordinarily participate in, the activity.
- Parent/family volunteers who assist with excursions (including swimming), camps and similar events, regardless of whether their own child is participating or not.
- Parent/family volunteers who regularly assist in school activities, regardless of whether their own child is participating or not

In addition, depending on the nature of the volunteer work, our school may ask the volunteer to provide other suitability checks at its discretion (for example, references, work history involving children and/or qualifications). Proof of identity may also be required in some circumstances.

### Non child-related work

On some occasions, parents and other members of the school community may volunteer to do work that is not child-related. For example; volunteering on the weekend for gardening, maintenance, working bees, parents and friends club coordination, school council, participating in sub-committees of school council, fete coordination, other fundraising groups that meet in the evenings] during which children will not be, or would not reasonably be expected to be, present.

Volunteers for this type of work are not required to have Working with Children or other suitability checks as they are not engaged in child-related work and children are not generally present during these activities. However, Warragul North Primary School reserves the right to undertake suitability checks, including proof of identity, Working with Children Checks, at its discretion if considered necessary for any particular activities or circumstances.

School council members and volunteers on any sub-committee of school council will be required to provide a valid WWC Check. Whilst we acknowledge that these volunteers will not be engaging in child-related work as part of their role, we believe that it is important that our volunteers who are involved in making important decisions about our school which will have an impact on students do have a valid WWC Check.

### Management and supervision

Volunteer workers will be expected to comply with any reasonable direction of the principal (or their nominee). This will include the requirement to follow our school's Statement of Commitment to Child Safety and our Child Safety Code of Conduct. The principal has the discretion to make a decision about the ongoing suitability of a volunteer worker and may determine at any time whether or not a person is suitable to volunteer at Warragul North Primary School.

Warragul North Primary School will provide any appropriate induction and/or training for volunteer workers. The principal (or their nominee) will determine what induction and/or training is necessary depending on what type of work the volunteer will be undertaking.

Volunteers will be provided induction in relation to Warragul North Primary School's child safety practices, including reporting obligations and procedures.

The principal (or their nominee) will determine what supervision, if any, of volunteers is required for the type of work being performed.

### Compensation

### Personal injury

Volunteer workers are covered by the Department of Education and Training's Workers Compensation Policy if they suffer personal injury in the course of engaging in school work.

### Property damage

If a volunteer worker suffers damage to their property in the course of carrying out school work, the Minister (or delegate) may authorise such compensation as they consider reasonable in the circumstances. Claims of this nature should be directed to the principal who will direct them to the Department's Legal Division.

### Public liability insurance


The Department of Education and Training's public liability insurance policy applies when a volunteer worker engaged in school work is legally liable for:

- a claim for bodily injury to a third party
- damage to or the destruction of a third party's property.

### REVIEW CYCLE

This policy will be reviewed as part of the school's five year review cycle.

This policy was ratified by School Council in July 2018





# Hello from the Acorn Room



There is often much concern expressed about children's screen time and use of social media. Technology can and does play a wonderful role in enhancing our lives for the better in many ways. But excess consumption and the wrong type of screen content can have a negative impact.

Here are just a few of the dangers to be aware of. Watching violence, depicted in movies and video games, has long been established as increasing children's likelihood to engage in violent behaviour themselves. Frequently schools find themselves dealing with the fallout of their students' out-of-hour's interactions on social media. It has been found that adolescents' late-night mobile phone use was directly linked to poor quality sleep, which subsequently led to poorer mental health outcomes, reduced coping, and lowered self-esteem. Modern gaming now involves multiple online players, often interacting uncensored, some, such as Fortnite, drawing both mature gamers as well as younger players. There are some very alarming statistics emerging about children's age of exposure to pornography online becoming younger and more prevalent.

### Here are some tips:

- Talk with your child about their use of technology, including the potential dangers and negotiate healthy boundaries
- Computers, tablets and smartphones should be used in common spaces in the household, not behind closed doors in bedrooms
- Take technology off children in the evenings
- Hold off on giving your child a Smartphone. The old style phones can still be used for calls and text messaging without many of the pitfalls which come with the additional features of a Smartphone
- Get familiar with social media have your children's login details (and follow minimum age requirements)
- It is much easier to start off strict, then loosen the reigns as children mature
- Use software to filter and monitor children's use of technology e.g. Safe Surfer
- Stay engaged

We can feel great pressure from our children to permit them a greater amount of freedom with their technology than is helpful for their developing maturity. As parents, we need to be strong in setting and maintaining healthy boundaries, and as our children mature, allowing them more freedom to develop their own strategies for staying safe online. Talk with other parents and support each other through this very complex task of parenting in an increasingly digital age.

- DEFIBULATION

# How much school is a child missing throughout their education?

1 day a fortnight = 20 days a year = 4 weeks a year = over 1.5 years (P - 12)

1 day a week = 40 days a year = 8 weeks a year = over 2.5 years (P - 12)

2 days a week = 80 days a year = 16 weeks a year = over 5 years (P - 12)

3 days a week = 120 days a year = 24 weeks a year = nearly 8 years (P - 12)

A student who is half an hour late each day misses the equivalent of 16.6 days of learning each year. This is equivalent to over 4 weeks a year = 1.5 years (P - 12)

### **TERM FOUR UNIFORM REMINDER**





# WuShKa Learning to Read

Wushka is an online reading program which helps students develop reading skills and includes an extensive selection of fiction and nonfiction levelled texts.

Every levelled text has an online comprehension quiz and printable support material. It is very pleasing that of the 603 students currently enrolled at Warragul North Primary School, 486 have signed up for Wushka. These students have access to Wushka seven days a week.

This is a great program for students to have, especially over holiday periods, as they can use it to maintain and improve their literacy skills.



Dear Parents,

We are now using Wushka's cloud-based levelled reading program at school and would love you to continue reading with your child at home. The program encourages students to engage with fiction and non-fiction texts on interactive devices. All School Readers are levelled from Level 1 through to Level 31+ and have been developed using decades of educational publishing experience.

Recognising that the best outcomes are achieved when students continue reading at home, the Wushka School Readers are now available after school hours. The program is individually tailored by your child's classroom teacher and allows readers to be set for homework.

The bulk purchase also means all students have the same supplies (e.g. pencils, pens, rulers, paper, paint, glue, etc). This cost also includes materials and equipment for Visual Arts, Performing Arts and Physical Education. On the school account statement that parents receive the student supplies are charged as 'Essential Education Items' as per the Department of Education guidelines.

# MATHS PORTAL (MATHS ONLINE) \$20.00 (PER STUDENT FOUNDATION - YEAR 6)

Maths Online is an educational website catering for Kindergarten through to Year 12. Maths Online enables children to use tutorials to learn and revise a large range of topics. It has a comprehensive Australian K - 12 curriculum with more than 1400 animated and narrated mathematics lessons, a bank of tests and instant feedback to students. Once payment has been made a personal password is issued allowing access 24 hours, seven days a week.

# ENGLISH PORTAL (WUSHKA) \$20.00 (PER STUDENT FOUNDATION - YEAR 6)

Wushka is an online levelled school reading program which helps students learn to read and includes an extensive selection of fiction and non-fiction levelled school readers. Every levelled reader has an online comprehension quiz and printable teacher support material. Teachers manage their own class, easily setting class reading levels, reading groups and choosing readers to read at home. Once payment has been made a personal password is issued allowing access 24 hours, seven days a week.

# HEADPHONES \$20.00 (PER STUDENT FOUNDATION - YEAR 6)

For use in classrooms with laptops, i-Pads, i-Pods and audio equipment. Students will use the headphones during Digital Technology lessons. Headphones are to be retained from year to year.



# MEMORY STICK \$20.00 (PER STUDENT YEARS 3 - 6)

For use at school and home to enable students to store their school work. These are supplied with a Warragul North Primary School lanyard. Memory sticks are to be retained from year to year.

# GROUNDS MAINTENANCE CHARGE \$35.00 (PER FAMILY)

Parents are keen to see the school's buildings and grounds properly maintained in order to provide their children with a clean, tidy and safe learning environment. To assist in achieving this goal payment of the grounds maintenance charge will allow the school to engage paid labour.

# School Council Report



Hello, my name is Brett Kersten and I serve on the Warragul North Primary School Council as a parent representative, also as the Buildings and Grounds Convenor. This is my fifth year serving the school in this position.

I have two children at the school. Ben who is in Year Six and his last year at the school before heading off to secondary school. Claire is in Year Four and doing well. It has been a pleasure

to watch my two children blossom at such a wonderful school as the Warragul North Primary School. It is a credit to all the teachers, staff and the amazing team in their various roles that have produced such a happy, nurturing learning environment for our children.

When I joined the team on School Council as the Buildings and Grounds Convenor in 2013, I did not really know what the role entailed. Fortunately for me, I was given much support from the school Principal, Ms Corinne Collins, and the Business Manager, Stuart Konstanty. As a result of their support, and patience, I was able to learn the role and to evolve with it as the school evolved.

As a result we have been able to achieve much in the way of maintenance and upkeep of the school, while at the same time improving and upgrading the various areas within the school boundaries, as well, and in liaison with the Baw Baw Shire, around the outside of the school, i.e. footpaths, parking, nature strips, road markings, signs and much more.

This year began with the completion of the footpaths along Princess Street, Edinburgh Street and Dundee Street. This provided a safer route to the school during drop off and pick up times, but also improved the parking situation around the school.

Hard surfaces have also been completed between the footpaths and the roadside curve, and raised and lifted footpaths have been cut back and levelled for safer and easier pedestrian usage. A landscaping engineer was engaged resulting in the oval regeneration and the pruning and upkeep of the gardens. This has relieved pressure on Working Bee volunteers while at the same time has uplifted the school appearance. I have been informed by independent sources that our school is the showcase school of the area. Artificial grass has been extended all the way to the South East corner of the school, lowering maintenance and beautifying this area while opening this area up for children to sit, play and study in the open.

In partnership with the Baw Baw Shire, we were able to have a 'No Parking' zone marked out and signed in Edinburgh Street to allow for the safe crossing of the children exiting from Marble Alley. These are a sample of the works conducted around the school during these past twelve months.

I would like to acknowledge the incredible work that our WNPS Parent Club have done over this year. In particular with the installation of our new state of the art playground facilities. Our Parent Club have provided much for our school by way of hard work, long hours and commitment. They truly are our quiet achievers and deserve much recognition for their tireless efforts.

Many of you may not be aware of the behind the scenes work performed by our School Council members. Our School Council members comprise a team of dedicated education staff and parents working together in their various roles to provide the best safe, caring, learning environment for our children.

I bring to your attention our School Councillor for Grants and Sponsorships, Terri Wilks, who has been working incredibly long hours, tirelessly submitting applications and attending meetings throughout the year to secure funding for the various projects around the school. Terri secured several grants for the school this year. Recently, Terri's efforts have secured a \$60k grant for the upgrading of Marble Alley.

Another of our School Councillors, Kylie McNair, has taken up the challenge of organising the upgrade of the Marble Alley Project. Kylie has been given only a limited amount of time to organise this project in the hope that it be completed during the January school holidays. No pressure Kylie! Thus far, Kylie has visited several schools in the West Gippsland area to look at their play spaces, and has spent many days and nights searching the web and looking at images for suitable designs for the Marble Alley Project. She has sent out surveys requesting input from the student's, parent's and the greater WNPS community for feedback of what could be done with the area. She spent last week interviewing and involving the teaching staff for their ideas of how this space can be used.

Kylie has initiated and liaised with during the past two weeks an eminent local Landscape Designer, and has submitted a detailed Marble Alley Redevelopment Plan for approval. This is an exciting time for the WNPS, and if all goes to plan, the children will return to the school in 2019 with an upgraded Marble Alley which would be the envy of any school.

On Friday the 26th October, the school held its second twilight working bee. The working bee was a success, and on behalf of the WNPS Council, I thank all those families who volunteered their time in maintaining the upkeep of our school. I especially thank School Councillor and Buildings and Grounds Sub-Committee member Craig Black for stepping up and coordinating the Working Bee during my absence.

As the school year nears its completion, I would like to wish all the families of our Warragul North Primary School Community the very best for 2019.

# Nude Food Day - Tuesday 20th November

Warragul North Primary School will hold a 'Nude Food' day on **TUESDAY 20TH NOVEMBER**.

This is a good time to put some of the 8Rs into practice. Let's work together to reduce our school's waste.

Nude Food lunches should ideally be:

- Nutritious
- In reusable containers or wrapped in beeswax paper;
- 'The right amount of food' encourage your children to bring home uneaten food to eat after school these can be eaten as a snack at home.
- Food and drinks bought in bulk packaging (i.e. large bags of chips versus convenience packaging) and reduce the amount of packaging thrown out.

Any soft, flexible packaging waste you do have can be recycled at Coles (i.e. chip packets, plastic wraps, etc.). This is recycled into many different products, including outdoor furniture for schools and councils.

Why just do these things on Nude Food day, when every day could be a Nude Food day?

# What We Need is Worm Farms!

One of the dirtier jobs during the Waste Audit was collecting the food scraps – gloves definitely required!

Our school produces over 80kg of food scraps every week, or 3.2 tonnes every year. When this goes to landfill, it produces 'methane', said to be one of the most significant causes of global warming.

Consequently the Environment and Sustainability Group have set up our new worm farms. Eight 440L compost bins, modified to become worm farms.

A big thankyou to Bunnings, Warragul for their very generous donation of the compost bin, 1000 worms and associated equipment to set up the worm farms. Cherrie Hall from Bunnings came to WNPS and assisted us to establish the worm farms.

We are also grateful for a donation of \$1000 from the Drouin & District Community Bank Branch towards the worm farm project. It would not have been possible without their generous support.

We hope in the future, our worm farm reduces our waste significantly.
