On behalf of our school community I thank Anita for her leadership and achievements as convenor of Parent Club during 2018.


Professional Learning Communities Coaching

Hello from the Acorn Room



Among the most lasting and powerful traditions in family life is one that seems to have more influence than almost any other – the family meal. Research has shown that regular and meaningful family meals offer a large variety of benefits to children and parents. Family meals are an opportunity for strengthening family connection

and passing on family values. Conversation around the dinner table teaches patience and respect in communication. Parents have the opportunity to be aware of and monitor their children's moods, behaviours and activities with friends. If a child knows that he or she can expect a reliable schedule, such as an evening meal as a family, it increases his or her sense of security and improves well-being. Family meals make a positive impact on young children's language acquisition and literacy development and are strongly associated with increased consumption of healthy foods and reduced risk of childhood obesity in children and adolescence. Other positive outcomes include decreased risk of substance use or delinquency, heightened personal and social well-being, and better academic performance.

Although there are many benefits to eating meals as a family, there are also many obstacles to achieving this. It is hard to all be in the same place at the same time, let alone with a cooked meal on the table and everyone ready and willing to connect as a family!

My suggestion is to start with what is achievable for you and your family. Perhaps just aim for one meal together a week. If even that is near impossible, make a special event out of morning tea, afternoon tea, dessert or supper. Ensure all screens are off or put away, and perhaps try some of the conversation starters below.

- 1. What's your favourite place in the house? Why?
- 2. What's the best thing that happened today?
- 3. If you could only eat one food and nothing else for three days in a row, what would it be?
- 4. What made you laugh today?
- 5. If you could go on a holiday anywhere in the world, where would it be? Why?
- 6. Invent a new ice cream flavour.
- 7. If you were famous for something, what would it be?
- 8. Describe yourself in three words.

Warragul North Primary School offers chaplaincy and pastoral care to students and families in the Acorn Room on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

How much school is a child missing throughout their education?

1 day a fortnight = 20 days a year = 4 weeks a year = over 1.5 years (P - 12)

1 day a week = 40 days a year = 8 weeks a year = over 2.5 years (P - 12)

2 days a week = 80 days a year = 16 weeks a year = over 5 years (P - 12)

3 days a week = 120 days a year = 24 weeks a year = nearly 8 years (P - 12)

A student who is half an hour late each day misses the equivalent of 16.6 days of learning each year. This is equivalent to over 4 weeks a year = 1.5 years (P - 12)







Setting Future Directions for Warragul North Primary School

- Keeping the school informed of any changes to your child's medical condition.
- Ensuring the school has the correct and in date medication for your child.
- Reviewing your child's ASCIA Action Plan annually (or after an allergic reaction) with your medical practitioner, and providing the school with the new plan.

WNPS VOLUNTEERS POLICY

The Warragul North Primary School Council have completed an in depth review of the Child Safe Standards this year. The WNPS Volunteers Policy has been reviewed and some significant changes made by School Council. Please read the policy which is included in this newsletter.

WNPS Volunteers Policy

PURPOSE

To outline the processes that Warragul North Primary school will follow to recruit, screen, supervise and manage volunteers to provide a child safe environment, and to explain the legal rights of volunteers.

DEFINITIONS

Child-related work: work that usually involves direct contact (including in person, over the phone, written and online communication) with a child that is a central part of that person's duties. It does not include work that involves occasional contact with children that is incidental to the work.

Closely related family member: parent, carer, parent/carer's spouse or domestic partner, stepparent, parent/carer's mother or father in-law, grandparent, uncle or aunt, brother or sister, including step or half siblings.

Volunteer worker: A volunteer school worker is a person who voluntarily engages in school work or approved community work without payment or reward.

School work: School work means:

- Carrying out the functions of a school council
- Any activity carried out for the welfare of a school, by the school council, any parents' club or association or any other body organised to promote the welfare of the school
- Any activity carried out for the welfare of the school at the request of the principal or school council
- Providing assistance in the work of any school or kindergarten
- Attending meetings in relation to government schools convened by any organisation which receives government financial support

This is a broad definition and means that volunteers who participate in school community activities, such as fundraising and assisting with excursions, are legally protected (ie indemnified) from action by others in the event of an injury or accident whilst they are performing volunteer school work in good faith.

POLICY

Warragul North Primary School is committed to implementing and following practices which protect the safety and wellbeing of children and our staff and volunteers. The procedures set out in this policy are designed to ensure that Warragul North Primary School's volunteers are suitable to work with children and are well-placed to make a positive contribution to our school community.

Working with students

Warragul North Primary School values the many volunteers that assist in our classrooms/with sports events/camps/excursions/school concerts/other events and programs. To ensure that we are meeting our legal obligations under the *Working With Children Act 2005* (Vic) and the Child Safe Standards, Warragul North Primary School is required to undertake suitability checks which may include a Working With Children Check, proof of identity, work history involving children and/or reference checks.

Considering our legal obligations, and our commitment to ensuring that Warragul North Primary School is a child safe environment, we will require volunteers to hold a current WWC Check and have a copy of their valid card recorded by administration staff for verification in the following circumstances:

- Volunteers who are not parent/family members
 of any student at the school are required to have a
 WWC Check if they are engaged in child-related
 work regardless of whether they are being supervised.
- Parent/family volunteers who are assisting with any classroom or school activities involving direct contact with children in circumstances where the volunteer's child is not participating, or does not ordinarily participate in, the activity.
- Parent/family volunteers who assist with excursions (including swimming), camps and similar events, regardless of whether their own child is participating or not.
- Parent/family volunteers who regularly assist in school activities, regardless of whether their own child is participating or not

In addition, depending on the nature of the volunteer work, our school may ask the volunteer to provide other suitability checks at its discretion (for example, references, work history involving children and/or qualifications). Proof of identity may also be required in some circumstances.

Non child-related work

On some occasions, parents and other members of the school community may volunteer to do work that is not child-related. For example; volunteering on the weekend for gardening, maintenance, working bees, parents and friends club coordination, school council, participating in sub-committees of school council, fete coordination, other fundraising groups that meet in the evenings] during which children will not be, or would not reasonably be expected to be, present.

Volunteers for this type of work are not required to have Working with Children or other suitability checks as they are not engaged in child-related work and children are not generally present during these activities. However, Warragul North Primary School reserves the right to undertake suitability checks, including proof of identity, Working with Children Checks, at its discretion if considered necessary for any particular activities or circumstances.

School council members and volunteers on any sub-committee of school council will be required to provide a valid WWC Check. Whilst we acknowledge that these volunteers will not be engaging in child-related work as part of their role, we believe that it is important that our volunteers who are involved in making important decisions about our school which will have an impact on students do have a valid WWC Check.

Management and supervision

Volunteer workers will be expected to comply with any reasonable direction of the principal (or their nominee). This will include the requirement to follow our school's Statement of Commitment to Child Safety and our Child Safety Code of Conduct. The principal has the discretion to make a decision about the ongoing suitability of a volunteer worker and may determine at any time whether or not a person is suitable to volunteer at Warragul North Primary School.

Warragul North Primary School will provide any appropriate induction and/or training for volunteer workers. The principal (or their nominee) will determine what induction and/or training is necessary depending on what type of work the volunteer will be undertaking.

Volunteers will be provided induction in relation to Warragul North Primary School's child safety practices, including reporting obligations and procedures. The principal (or their nominee) will determine what supervision, if any, of volunteers is required for the type of work being performed.

Compensation

Personal injury

Volunteer workers are covered by the Department of Education and Training's Workers Compensation Policy if they suffer personal injury in the course of engaging in school work.

Property damage

If a volunteer worker suffers damage to their property in the course of carrying out school work, the Minister (or delegate) may authorise such compensation as they consider reasonable in the circumstances. Claims of this nature should be directed to the principal who will direct them to the Department's Legal Division.

Public liability insurance

The Department of Education and Training's public liability insurance policy applies when a volunteer worker engaged in school work is legally liable for:

- a claim for bodily injury to a third party
- damage to or the destruction of a third party's property.

REVIEW CYCLE

This policy will be reviewed as part of the school's five year review cycle.

This policy was ratified by School Council in July 2018



AFI Clinic

During Term Four our Year Four, Five and Six grades have had the opportunity to attend an Australian Rules Football Clinic run by George Morgan and Paul Vaughan. George and Paul are representatives from AFL Australia and AFL Gippsland.

The pilot program delivered, has been developed through discussions with AFL Gippsland, AFL Victoria and Warragul North Primary School. Together we have worked towards aligning the values of our school and the wider sporting community. The children have been introduced to the fundamentals of umpiring and football. They have also been made aware of the wide range of opportunities available to them through football. George and Paul have also ensured that the characteristics of good sportsmanship have been highlighted throughout the three-week clinic.

I would like to thank George and Paul for leaving such a positive impact on our staff and students and for giving their time so freely.

The Junior School Sports Day will take place on Thursday 6th December at school for Foundation to Year Two children. A note with all the details and a timetable was sent home last week.


TERM FOUR UNIFORM REMINDER




SCIENCEWORKS WONDERS

The overwhelming themes from the feedback was for a nature based play space, active play spaces and creative, hands on areas. We had a number of requests for swings, trampolines, and flying foxes. Unfortunately these items aren't suited to schools, particularly big schools. If we had three trampolines or swings we calculated that each student would get approximately 15 seconds each per lunchtime and they require huge safety considerations and constant supervision so it's best to enjoy these items at home.

We were hoping to add a slide into the side of the hill but unfortunately the advice we've had from the playground suppliers is that we don't have enough of a slope down the hill without adding a platform which would be costly and a bit unsightly. BUT our wish list for the area is full of interesting and different things to what we have elsewhere in the school yard.

We have tried to include items that allow a number of children to play at once, that provide enjoyment for all year levels, that includes physical activities as well as space for creative, nature based play. We'll have another update on the plan next newsletter.





School Costs 2019

The schools costs for 2019 were confirmed at the October meeting of School Council.

Statements will be posted out to all families at the beginning of 2019 with payment due as soon as possible. Families wishing to pay in two instalments should pay the first instalment by the end of February and the second instalment by the end of Term Two.

Payment can be made in person at the school office, by sending the payment in a named envelope with your child or online using internet banking. Our bank details are: BSB 313-140 ACCOUNT NO. 12012190.

Families who are in receipt of a Centrelink payment (e.g. Family Tax Benefit, Parenting Payment, etc) are able to set up a Centrepay facility to pay their school account in fortnightly instalments. Please call at the school office for further information or to set up Centrepay.

WARRAGUL NORTH PRIMARY SCHOOL SCHOOL COSTS 2019:

The school charges for the 2019 year as set by School Council are as follows:

\$200.00 (PER STUDENT FOUNDATION) \$190.00 (PER STUDENT YEARS 1 - 6)

To ensure all WNPS students have the stationery supplies needed for the academic year the Warragul North School Council makes a bulk purchase from reputable suppliers on behalf of parents. This

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ensures parents are able to purchase their child's supplies very cost effectively and easily. The bulk purchase also means all students have the same supplies (e.g. pencils, pens, rulers, paper, paint, glue, etc). This cost also includes materials and equipment for Visual Arts, Performing Arts and Physical Education. On the school account statement that parents receive the student supplies are charged as 'Essential Education Items' as per the Department of Education guidelines.

MATHS PORTAL (MATHS ONLINE) \$20.00 (PER STUDENT FOUNDATION - YEAR 6)

Maths Online is an educational website catering for Kindergarten through to Year 12. Maths Online enables children to use tutorials to learn and revise a large range of topics. It has a comprehensive Australian K - 12 curriculum with more than 1400 animated and narrated mathematics lessons, a bank of tests and instant feedback to students. Once payment has been made a personal password is issued allowing access 24 hours, seven days a week.

ENGLISH PORTAL (WUSHKA) \$20.00 (PER STUDENT FOUNDATION - YEAR 6)

Wushka is an online levelled school reading program which helps students learn to read and includes an extensive selection of fiction and non-fiction levelled school readers. Every levelled reader has an online comprehension quiz and printable teacher support material. Teachers manage their own class, easily setting class reading levels, reading groups and choosing readers to read at home. Once payment has been made a personal password is issued allowing access 24 hours, seven days a week.

HEADPHONES \$20.00 (PER STUDENT FOUNDATION - YEAR 6)

For use in classrooms with laptops, i-Pads, i-Pods and audio equipment. Students will use the headphones during Digital Technology lessons. Headphones are to be retained from year to year.



MEMORY STICK \$20.00 (PER STUDENT YEARS 3 - 6)

For use at school and home to enable students to store their school work. These are supplied with a Warragul North Primary School lanyard. Memory sticks are to be retained from year to year.

GROUNDS MAINTENANCE CHARGE \$35.00 (PER FAMILY)

Parents are keen to see the school's buildings and grounds properly maintained in order to provide their children with a clean, tidy and safe learning environment. To assist in achieving this goal payment of the grounds maintenance charge will allow the school to engage paid labour.



WORKING BEE \$60.00 (PER FAMILY)

The Buildings and Grounds sub-committee of School Council hold a minimum of two working bees each year. At Warragul North Primary School we recognise that parents cannot always be available on these days. The working bee charge enables families to contribute in lieu of attendance.

'FOR THE RECORD' SCHOOL YEARBOOK \$30.00 (PER FAMILY)

The school yearbook is issued at the end of the year to the eldest child in each family. It is a fantastic record of the Warragul North Primary School year and includes photos of the many activities the children take part in during the year such as concerts, production, camps, excursions and incursions.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students

HOW TO APPLY

New applicants should contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from www.education.vic.gov.au/csef

If you applied for the CSEF at your child's school in 2018, you do not need to complete an application form in 2019 unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

You only need to complete an application form if any of the following changes have occurred:

- new student enrolments; your child has started or changed schools in 2019 or you did not apply in 2018.
- changed family circumstances; such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing at the school in 2019.

Check with the school office if you are unsure.


