## 2019 Achievements

I would like to thank the Environment and Sustainability Team at our school for their efforts this year. You have helped make our school more sustainable.
Here is what we achieved in 2019:

- We applied for and gained a free CERES Environmental Leadership Incursion for our Environment and Sustainability Team. We then visited a ResourceSmart school in Yallourn South to continue this process. A good time was had by all!
- We became a 'Junior Landcare’ school - we hope to adopt a local park and tend this in the future.
- We harvested and grew seeds from our large peppermint gum in Marble Alley.
- We completed a biodiversity audit to look at the diversity of flora (plant life) at our school - this will go towards our ResourceSmart Schools accreditation
- We diverted approximately one tonne $(1,000 \mathrm{~kg})$ of organic material from landfill
- We began recycling our old markers, textas and pens (we have been sending around 2,800 of these to landfill each year!)
- We completed the National Recycling Week challenge and won a GoPro! This will arrive next year!
- We assisted in planting out the 'new and improved' Marble Alley
- We began to investigate ways we can improve our recycling across the school - stay tuned!
- We helped maintain our school vegie garden

## D.E.T. Mobile Phone Policy

In June 2019, the Minister for Education announced a new Mobile Phone Policy that will come into effect from Term One, 2020. The new policy is a ministerial policy formally issued by the Minister for Education under the Education and Training Reform Act 2006. The Mobile Phone Policy establishes that from Term One, 2020 students who bring mobile phones to school must have them switched off and securely stored during school hours.
An audit conducted during Term Four, 2019 at Warragul North Primary School revealed that very few students bring mobile phones to our school.

Only about six Foundation to Year Three students brought in a phone. About 30 students in total from Year Four and Year Five had a phone. There were about 30 students in Year Six who had a phone. This means that around 66 out of 625 students have a phone at school. Our school has fortunately not experienced many problems managing mobile phones up to this time.
Early in 2020 we will provide further information regarding this new policy and its implementation.

## Botanic Gardens

Recently the Grants Sub-Committee of School Council successfully applied for a Landcare Grant which enabled our Years Three and Four students to participate in an excursion to the Royal Botanic Gardens Victoria in Cranbourne free of charge on Monday 16th December. The excursion offered an excellent opportunity for our students to further their understanding of the environment and related issues in an interactive, safe and stimulating outdoor setting.

The program 'Seed to Tree' was developed by the qualified teachers of the Gardens Education Service to provide an enjoyable and valuable learning experience for students. This stunning Australian Garden is a contemporary landscape space that showcased the beauty and diversity of Australian flora. Students participated in a guided exploration through the gardens and discovered the diversity of plants in Australia.



## HEADLICE

A timely reminder to all families. Please use the forthcoming school holidays to check your child's hair for head lice. It is a good opportunity to get on top of this pesky problem. Thank you!

## Treating and controlling headlice

While children are at school many families will have contact with head lice. The information contained here will help you treat and control head lice.

## Catching head lice

Head lice have been around for many thousands of years. Anyone can get head lice

Head lice are small, wingless, blood sucking insects Their colour varies from whitish-brown to reddish-brown. Head lice only survive on humans. If isolated from the head they die very quickly (usually within 24 hours).

People get head lice from direct hair to hair contact with another person who has head lice. This can happen when people play, cuddle or work closely together.

Head lice do not have wings or jumping legs so they cannot fly or jump from head to head. They can only crawl.

## Finding head lice

Many lice do not cause an itch, so you have to look carefully to find them.

Head lice are found on the hair itself and move to the scalp to feed. They have six legs which end in a claw and they rarely fall from the head. Louse eggs (also called nits) are laid within 1.5 cm of the scalp and are firmly attached to the hair. They resemble dandruff, but can't be brushed off.

Lice can crawl and hide. The easiest and most effective way to find them is to follow these steps:

Step 1 Comb any type of hair conditioner on to dry, brushed (detangled) hair. This stuns the lice and makes it difficult for them to grip the hair or crawl around.

Step 2 Now comb sections of the hair with a fine tooth, head lice comb.

Step 3 Wipe the conditioner from the comb onto a paper towel or tissue.

Step 4 Look on the tissue and on the comb for lice and eggs.

Step 5 Repeat the combing for every part of the head at least four or five times.

If lice or eggs are found, the hair should be treated.
If the person has been treated recently and you only find empty hatched eggs, you may not have to treat, as the empty eggs could be from a previous episode.

## Treating head lice

Treating head lice involves removing lice and eggs from the hair. There are two ways you can do this:

1. Buying and using a head lice lotion or shampoo, following the instructions on the product
2. Using the conditioner and comb method (described under 'finding head lice') every second day until there have been no live lice found for ten days.

If you choose to use a head lice product always read and follow the instructions provided with the product carefully. The following points may also be helpful:

- Head lice products must be applied to all parts of the hair and scalp.
- No treatment kills all of the eggs so treatment must involve two applications, seven days apart. The first treatment kills all lice; the second treatment kills the lice that may have hatched from eggs not killed by the first treatment.
- Cover the person's eyes while the treatment is being applied. A towel is a good way to do this.
- If you are using a lotion, apply the product to dry hair.
- If you are using a shampoo, wet the hair, but use the least amount of water possible.
- Apply the treatment near the scalp, using an ordinary comb to cover the hair from root to tip. Repeat this several times until all the hair is covered.

There is no need to treat the whole family - unless they also have head lice.

Concentrate on the head - there is no need to clean the house or the classroom.

Only the pillowcase requires washing - either wash it in hot water (at least $60^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ ) or dry it using a clothes dryer on the hot or warm setting.
