## Canteen Survey for Healthy Achievement program

Hopefully, you will have seen in recent newsletters, the work WNPS is doing around the Healthy Achievement Program, a program delivered by the Cancer Council of Victoria which help schools create a healthier environment for their students, staff and families.

### Healthy Achievement Program Priority Areas:



We are currently focusing on:

### 'Healthy Eating and Oral Health'

#### Benefits of Healthy Eating:

- ***In childhood and adolescence, a healthy diet is essential for growth and development.***
- ***Healthy eating prevents health issues such as iron deficiency, dental issues, and obesity.***
- ***When children and young people eat well, they learn better, are more alert and are more likely to grow and develop to their full potential.***
- ***Good nutrition at school can help them establish healthy eating habits throughout some of the most influential years of their life.***



With the survey the Healthy Achievement Program Committee are aiming to gain an insight into our school community's thoughts on the foods listed on our current canteen menu and potential changes with the view to making food choices healthier.

The committee is considering:

- only offering foods that meet the DET school canteen and other school services policy
- less processed products such as dim sims
- increase healthy alternatives such as sushi or fruit
- using a commercial company, Alimentos Catering
- online ordering and payment using an app for parents to order lunch once a week for their child / children e.g. Foundation to Year Two one day a week and Year Three to Year Six one day a week
- permanently closing the school canteen for lunch orders and snacks
- the school would not continue to employ a canteen co-ordinator for 13 hours each week

As you can see completing the survey will provide the committee with data and evidence from our school community enabling the committee to make informed decisions.

# Hello from the *Acorn Room*



“A gentle answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger” Proverbs 15:1

I came across a reflection on this proverb recently which drew attention to our heart motivation behind the things we say when we argue. We can speak to simply make the truth clear (which may be painful to

hear), or we speak specifically to inflict pain, to make the other person feel foolish or bad. We might tell ourselves and others the former motive is what drives us, but usually it is the latter.

In contrast, the gentle answer means speaking patiently, tenderly, as affirmatively as possible, and always calmly. One of the best ways to help an angry person is to surround them with non-angry speech. A gentle answer must still be truthful but filled with evident concern and no ill will.

To do this, we need to be calm ourselves. I often work with children to try to help them find ways they can calm and sooth themselves when they are feeling big feelings such as anger. We, as adults, may need to find strategies too if we are finding ourselves speaking harsh words in anger. Here are some ideas to calm down for both children and adults to try:

- Concentrate on taking small sips of water
- Go outside and focus on nature
- Exercise regularly
- Spend time doing something you enjoy such as playing a musical instrument
- Identify five things you can see, four things you can hear, three things you can feel, two things you can smell and one thing you can taste
- Name the emotion
- Run your fingertips down the palms of your hands for one minute

Some are strategies to instantly calm down and others are good habits to be incorporated into our routines. There are many different strategies you can try. I encourage you to find what works for you and your child.

## STUDENTS USE OF MOBILE PHONES AND PERSONAL MOBILE DEVICES

The DET Mobile Phone Policy came into effect from Term One, 2020. The policy is a ministerial order formally issued by the Minister for Education. The ministerial order establishes that students who bring mobile phones or personal mobile devices to school must have them switched off and securely stored during school hours.

If your child brings a mobile phone or personal mobile device to school they are required to give the device to their class teacher for safe-keeping during the school day. The device will be returned to them at the end of the day.

It was noted that the School Achievement Program committee were in the process of surveying parents, students and staff as part of the 'Healthy Eating and Oral Health' priority area.


Projects to be completed during the next semester include a rearrangement and refurbishment of the administration area and the senior wing exterior will be cleaned and the fascia painted.

# I.C.A.S. ASSESSMENTS

Warragul North Primary School is committed to providing opportunities for all students to be challenged and extended in their learning. In 2021, students in Years Two to Six will have the opportunity to compete in the highly regarded International Competitions and Assessments for Schools (I.C.A.S.). **The Assessments are not compulsory.**

In each competition, the students receive a certificate and an individual report indicating the skills that they have demonstrated. The student reports are useful for highlighting your child's strengths and areas for improvement, as well as charting their achievement against national and regional standards. They also provide students who possess a particular skill or talent in one or more of these disciplines with an opportunity for extension.

I.C.A.S. Assessments will be completed online this year, a move that reflects a sector-wide transition to computer-based assessment. 

## FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

### CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors. Excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works while sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are a part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students

### HOW TO APPLY

New applicants should contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from the website below.

If you applied for CSEF at your child's school last year, you do not need to complete an application form this year unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

You only need to complete an application form if any of the following changes have occurred:

- **new student enrolments;** your child has started or changed schools this year.
- **changed family circumstances;** such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing this year.

Check with the school office if you are unsure.



## TREATING AND CONTROLLING HEAD LICE

A timely reminder to all families. Please use the forthcoming school holidays to check your child's hair for head lice. It is a good opportunity to get on top of this pesky problem. Thank you!

**While children are at school many families will have contact with head lice. The information contained here will help you treat and control head lice.**

### Catching head lice

Head lice have been around for many thousands of years. Anyone can get head lice.

Head lice are small, wingless, blood sucking insects. Their colour varies from whitish-brown to reddish-brown. Head lice only survive on humans. If isolated from the head they die very quickly (usually within 24 hours).

People get head lice from direct hair to hair contact with another person who has head lice. This can happen when people play, cuddle or work closely together.

Head lice do not have wings or jumping legs so they cannot fly or jump from head to head. They can only crawl.

### Finding head lice

Many lice do not cause an itch, so you have to **look carefully to find them**.

Head lice are found on the hair itself and move to the scalp to feed. They have six legs which end in a claw and they rarely fall from the head. Louse eggs (also called nits) are laid within 1.5 cm of the scalp and are firmly attached to the hair. They resemble dandruff, but can't be brushed off.

Lice can crawl and hide. The easiest and most effective way to find them is to follow these steps:

- Step 1** Comb any type of hair conditioner on to dry, brushed (detangled) hair. This stuns the lice and makes it difficult for them to grip the hair or crawl around.
- Step 2** Now comb sections of the hair with a fine tooth, head lice comb.
- Step 3** Wipe the conditioner from the comb onto a paper towel or tissue.
- Step 4** Look on the tissue and on the comb for lice and eggs.
- Step 5** Repeat the combing for every part of the head at least four or five times.

If lice or eggs are found, the hair should be treated.

If the person has been treated recently and you only find empty hatched eggs, you may not have to treat, as the empty eggs could be from a previous episode.

### Treating head lice

Treating head lice involves removing lice and eggs from the hair. There are two ways you can do this:

1. Buying and using a head lice lotion or shampoo, following the instructions on the product
2. Using the conditioner and comb method (described under 'finding head lice') every second day until there have been no live lice found for ten days.

If you choose to use a head lice product always read and follow the instructions provided with the product carefully. The following points may also be helpful:

- Head lice products must be applied to all parts of the hair and scalp.
- No treatment kills all of the eggs so treatment must involve two applications, seven days apart. The first treatment kills all lice; the second treatment kills the lice that may have hatched from eggs not killed by the first treatment.
- Cover the person's eyes while the treatment is being applied. A towel is a good way to do this.
- If you are using a lotion, apply the product to dry hair.
- If you are using a shampoo, wet the hair, but use the least amount of water possible.
- Apply the treatment near the scalp, using an ordinary comb to cover the hair from root to tip. Repeat this several times until all the hair is covered.

There is no need to treat the whole family - unless they also have head lice.

Concentrate on the head - there is no need to clean the house or the classroom.

Only the pillowcase requires washing - either wash it in hot water (at least 60°C) or dry it using a clothes dryer on the hot or warm setting.

## WHAT IS THE FLU AND SHOULD CHILDREN BE IMMUNISED?

Influenza, commonly called the flu, is an infection caused by a strain (version) of the influenza virus. It mainly affects the nose, throat and lungs, although it can involve other parts of the body. In healthy children it is much like a bad cold; however, influenza can cause more serious illness, especially in very young children and those with chronic medical conditions.
