PARKING | TRAFFIC FLOW DISABLED PARKING



To assist parents with parking rules around the school, a map explaining legal parking areas and traffic flow will be sent home again during Term Three.

Please be aware that the 'reserved' parking permit area near the

administration building is for staff use only and permits must be displayed on the windscreen.

If everyone adheres to the agreed parking areas and direction of traffic flow it creates a safer environment for children during drop off and pick up times.

Just a friendly reminder that the two disabled parking spaces provided outside the administration building are for people with a disabled parking permit only. It is also requested that you be mindful of other people who use this space and not double park across it. There has been reported instances of the spaces being regularly blocked not allowing access or allowing the vehicles parked to exit. Please do not park across these specially designated car spaces. Thank you.

To assist families to clearly understand the various parking signs displayed around our school, in our newsletters we will include detailed information from the VicRoads website.

Can I Park Here?

You are not allowed to park, stop or leave your vehicle:

- 🗶 Double parked
- Within an intersection (except on the continuous side of a continuing road of a T-intersection)
- Fully or partially across a driveway (except for two minutes to pick up or drop off passengers)
- If there is fewer than three metres of clear road left for other traffic
- On a footpath, nature strip or reservation (unless the vehicle is a motorcycle or bicycle)
- Across a footpath, bicycle path or passageway or footpath ramp (unless a sign allows it)
- In a no stopping area

are included in the orientation program which will commence early in Term Four, and to assist with class planning for 2022.

REPORTING STUDENT ABSENCES DURING REMOTE LEARNING

The Department of Education and Training sent advice to schools on how student attendance and absences are to be tracked, recorded and reported in the context of remote and flexible learning.

Schools have to:

- Note and record attendance once a day.
- Continue to keep a record of all student attendance and absences.
- Upload attendance / absence to D.E.T. once a day.

If your child will not be participating in learning from home on any particular day, please use our school's absence reporting line – 0447 503 536 (SMS only) to notify the school. Your child may be ill, attending the dentist or another type of appointment.

Student/Parent/Teacher Interviews Being Held 'Lockdown' Style!

Following discussion with teachers at this week's virtual staff meeting the following was decided as face-to-face interviews are not possible due to the current restrictions being in place in Victoria until at least midnight Tuesday 27th July.

- Teachers are to hold the interviews using Microsoft Teams, Webex or phone calls.
- Interviews can be held anytime between Wednesday 21st July to Tuesday 27th July during remote learning at a mutually agreeable time between parents and teachers or at the time booked on Sentral for Tuesday 27th July.
- Parents who wish to arrange an interview with their child's specialist teacher (e.g. Physical Education, Visual Arts, Performing Arts) please e-mail the school at warragul.north.ps@education. vic.gov.au or phone the office on 5623 4066.
- Student Support Group (SSG) meetings will be conducted during the week commencing Monday 2nd August and concluding Friday 6th August. If your child requires a SSG meeting you will be contacted to arrange a mutually convenient time for the SSG to take place.

CHILD SAFE STANDARDS

What do the child safe standards mean for your child and school?

Children have the right to be safe and protected, including at school. The child safe standards have been introduced in Victoria to achieve a zero-tolerance approach to child abuse. The seven child safe standards are:

- Strategies to embed an organisational culture of child safety, including through effective leadership arrangements
- A child safe policy and statement of commitment to child safety
- A code of conduct that establishes clear expectations for appropriate behaviour with children
- Screening, supervision, training and other human resource practices that reduce the risk of child abuse by new and existing personnel
- Processes for responding to and reporting suspected child abuse
- Strategies to identify and reduce or remove risks of child abuse
- Strategies to promote the participation and empowerment of children

For your information WNPS has:

- Strategies to embed a culture of child safety at the school and roles and responsibilities within the school for achieving these strategies
- A child safety policy and a statement of commitment to child safety
- Code of conduct outlining clear expectations for appropriate behaviour by school staff with children
- Strategies to promote child empowerment and participation
- Procedures for reporting suspected child abuse

Managing illness in schools and early childhood

One of the most important things we can do to slow the spread of coronavirus (COVID-19) in our community is to stay at home when we are unwell, even when we have the mildest of symptoms.

What you need to know

If a child is unwell, even with the mildest of symptoms, they must stay at home

If a child becomes unwell during the day, they must be collected from school/early childhood education and care (ECEC) as soon as possible.

- If a child has any of the symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) outlined below, however mild, they should get tested and they must remain at home until they receive their results:
- fever
- · chills or sweats
- cough
- sore throat
- shortness of breath
- runny nose
- loss of sense of smell or taste.

In certain circumstances headache, muscle soreness, stuffy nose, nausea, vomiting and diarrhoea may also be considered symptoms.

For further advice:

- call the 24-hour coronavirus (COVID-19) hotline 1800 675 398
- call a general practitioner
- use the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) <u>online self-assessment tool</u>.

Visit: Where to get tested.

A child must stay at home until they are symptom free, even if their coronavirus (COVID-19) test is negative

If a person has tested positive for coronavirus (COVID-19) or been identified as a close contact they must isolate/quarantine until they receive clearance from DHHS.

Children with persistent symptoms due to underlying conditions such as hay fever or asthma whose symptoms are clearly typical of their condition can continue to attend ECEC/school. They should be tested for COVID-19 if they develop symptoms that are different to or worse than their usual symptoms. They should consider getting a medical certificate from their GP to attend ECEC/school if they have persistent symptoms that may overlap with symptoms of COVID-19 such as cough or runny nose.

Younger children (pre-school up to Grade 2) may have prolonged post viral symptoms such as a runny nose or cough and may return to school/ ECEC following a negative COVID-19 test even if they are not completely free of symptoms. They will need a medical certificate from their GP to confirm they are otherwise well or have recovered from their acute illness.

For information on the minimum periods students and children need to stay at home for other conditions, refer to the <u>DHHS schoolexclusion table</u>.

4. Children do NOT need a medical certificate before returning to school/ECEC

Once symptoms have cleared, there is no requirement from the Department of Education and Training or DHHS for children/students to have a medical certificate before they return to school/ECEC.

Sadly, we are farewelling Steve Brown, who has given many years of service as a guitar teacher for a large number of students at WNPS. We wish Steve all the very best for the future and extend our heartfelt gratitude for his dedication and generous sharing of his talents and knowledge in his long association with the school.

We are pleased to welcome on board Alexandria Kirkbright, who will be available for voice (singing) lessons. Alex comes highly recommended as an accomplished singing teacher.

Joe Patrick has worked with us previously as a drum teacher, but returns to us as a guitar teacher. He will be replacing Steve Brown. Joe and Steve have been working together already with current guitar students and their families to ensure that the transition is seamless.

I.C.A.S. ASSESSMENTS



Dear Parents/Carers, 17 June 2021

Warragul North Primary School is committed to providing opportunities for all students to be challenged and extended in their learning. In 2021, students in Years Two to Six will have the opportunity to compete in the highly regarded International Competitions and Assessments for Schools (I.C.A.S.). **The Assessments are not compulsory.**

In each competition, the students receive a certificate and an individual report indicating the skills that they have demonstrated. The student reports are useful for highlighting your child's strengths and areas for improvement, as well as charting their achievement against national and regional standards. They also provide students who possess a particular skill or talent in one or more of these disciplines with an opportunity for extension.

I.C.A.S. Assessments will be completed online this year, a move that reflects a sector-wide transition to computer-based assessment. This allows greater accessibility for students and faster delivery of results. Learn more about ICAS here: https://www.icasassessments.com/. FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors. Excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works while sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are a part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students

HOW TO APPLY

New applicants should contact the school office to obtain a CSEF application form or download from the website below.

If you applied for CSEF at your child's school last year, you do not need to complete an application form this year unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

You only need to complete an application form if any of the following changes have occurred:


- new student enrolments; your child has started or changed schools this year.
- changed family circumstances; such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing this year.

Check with the school office if you are unsure.



COPING WITH COVID-19 IN YOUR FAMILY

Beyond Blue has some great information about how to talk to children about the pandemic. Of course we need to explain the situation without causing too much stress and use language that is age appropriate

How to talk about the Covid 19 pandemic with children and
