



In his latest book, Fully Human, Steve Biddulph talks about the concept of Spirituality. HEADLICE

A timely reminder to all families. Please use the forthcoming school holidays to check your child's hair for head lice. It is a good opportunity to get on top of this pesky problem. Thank you!

Treating and controlling headlice

If lice or eggs are found, the hair should be treated.

While children are at school many families will have contact with head lice. The information contained here will help you treat and control head lice.

Catching head lice

Head lice have been around for many thousands of years. Anyone can get head lice.

Head lice are small, wingless, blood sucking insects. Their colour varies from whitish-brown to reddish-brown. Head lice only survive on humans. If isolated from the head they die very quickly (usually within 24 hours).

People get head lice from direct hair to hair contact with another person who has head lice. This can happen when people play, cuddle or work closely together.

Head lice do not have wings or jumping legs so they cannot fly or jump from head to head. They can only crawl.

Finding head lice

Many lice do not cause an itch, so you have to **look** carefully to find them.

Head lice are found on the hair itself and move to the scalp to feed. They have six legs which end in a claw and they rarely fall from the head. Louse eggs (also called nits) are laid within 1.5 cm of the scalp and are firmly attached to the hair. They resemble dandruff, but can't be brushed off.

Lice can crawl and hide. The easiest and most effective way to find them is to follow these steps:

- Step 1 Comb any type of hair conditioner on to dry, brushed (detangled) hair. This stuns the lice and makes it difficult for them to grip the hair or crawl around.
- Step 2 Now comb sections of the hair with a fine tooth, head lice comb.
- Step 3 Wipe the conditioner from the comb onto a paper towel or tissue.
- Step 4 Look on the tissue and on the comb for lice and eggs.
- Step 5 Repeat the combing for every part of the head at least four or five times.

If the person has been treated recently and you only find empty hatched eggs, you may not have to treat, as the empty eggs could be from a previous episode.

Treating head lice

Treating head lice involves removing lice and eggs from the hair. There are two ways you can do this:

- 1. Buying and using a head lice lotion or shampoo, following the instructions on the product
- Using the conditioner and comb method (described under 'finding head lice') every second day until there have been no live lice found for ten days.

If you choose to use a head lice product always read and follow the instructions provided with the product carefully. The following points may also be helpful:


- Head lice products must be applied to all parts of the hair and scalp.
- No treatment kills all of the eggs so treatment must involve two applications, seven days apart. The first treatment kills all lice; the second treatment kills the lice that may have hatched from eggs not killed by the first treatment.
- Cover the person's eyes while the treatment is being applied. A towel is a good way to do this.
- If you are using a lotion, apply the product to dry hair.
- If you are using a shampoo, wet the hair, but use the least amount of water possible.
- Apply the treatment near the scalp, using an ordinary comb to cover the hair from root to tip. Repeat this several times until all the hair is covered.

There is no need to treat the whole family - unless they also have head lice.

Concentrate on the head - there is no need to clean the house or the classroom.

Only the pillowcase requires washing - either wash it in hot water (at least 60°C) or dry it using a clothes dryer on the hot or warm setting.






















END OF YEAR REPORTS

Compass

During the school holidays families will be e-mailed the information about Compass and how to register to use it.

To ensure all WNPS students have the stationery supplies needed for the academic year the Warragul North School Council makes a bulk purchase from reputable suppliers on behalf of parents. This ensures the children's supplies are purchased effectively and easily. The bulk purchase also means all students have the same supplies (e.g. pencils, pens, rulers, paper, paint, glue, etc).

Included are materials and equipment for Visual Arts, Performing Arts and Physical Education. Foundation students receive a WNPS satchel, a whiteboard and a set of headphones.

Students are provided with online platforms including Maths Online, Wushka, Phonics Hero, Literacy Planet and Ed Alive These are educational websites for Mathematics and reading that the children will use at school and will also have access to at home.

Performing Arts 2021 Review

Teachers - Mrs Catherine Matthys and Mrs Natalie Mead

JUNIOR:

In Semester Two in Performing Arts, students in Foundation, Year One and Year Two had the opportunity to learn about ways of telling a story through dance, song and drama.

Students have revised and learnt new dance steps, performing such dances as The Chicken Dance, The Macarena, The Hokey Pokey and other dance styles. Students have practised performing their dance to an audience and have taken turns at being the audience, practising how to behave as an appreciative and supportive audience member.

Students have experienced the art of the musical in simple terms, such as how the story-telling is enhanced by the songs involved, and have explored and learnt some songs from selected musicals.

Students have had the opportunity to explore and play various percussion instruments for self-expression, creating sounds and rhythms, and performing together to different styles of music.

MIDDLE:

Performing Arts in Semester Two focused on preparation for the Senior Concert. Students contributed ideas to their class item and practised and refined their act. Unfortunately, due to Covid-19, the final presentation of the concert was unable to occur.

Students have studied aspects of story-telling through music in film, as well as exploring musical expression in creating their own songs and chants.

Activities have included some performance to the class as audience, and reinforcing how to be an appreciative and encouraging audience to peers.

Students have studied instrument families, particularly those in an orchestra, and learnt about the different sounds created by different types of instruments.

SENIOR:

In Semester Two in Performing Arts, students have focused on preparing and rehearsing for the Senior Concert, collaborating on aspects of the performance through choreography and stagecraft. Unfortunately, due to Covid-19, the final presentation of the concert was unable to occur.

Students have undertaken song studies and music in film to delve into how music evokes feelings and enhances mood. Students have explored music in other cultures, comparing and contrasting characteristics of music and culture, and looking at how these continue to evolve and influence modern music styles.


FOUNDATION & YEAR ONE:

In Foundation and Year One, students practised a variety of fun and exciting modelling, construction and textile projects. They created animals of their own choice using plasticine, air-dry clay and kiln-fired clay. They also built carboard tube characters, robots made from recycled materials and egg-carton caterpillars. Students learnt to independently tie knots on wonderful jelly fish, sew around a sewing card or bookmark and to create terrific weaving mats. The emphasis has been on developing skills and techniques, while allowing for personal expression and creative choices.

YEAR TWO

In Year Two, students have focused on three-dimensional art, including sculpture and construction. Children have created imaginary creatures including monsters and robots and use different kinds of food as inspiration for their art, including donuts and cupcakes, vegetable face collages and the incredibly popular miniature foods.

Three-dimensional art encourages the development of fine motor skills, and builds understanding of the Elements of Art through play and experimentation.





YEAR THREE AND YEAR FOUR

Year Three and Year Four have explored sculpture using different types of clay. Linking to their classroom learning about coral reefs (Year Three) and rainforests (Year Four) made art inspired by different environments. Students used plasticine to create 3D 'paintings' of different environments, then used clay to make animals that live in those environments. Before painting their creatures, they learnt how to control their painting technique, particularly when mixing colours and their tints and shades.

In their abstract drawing unit, students were introduced to one-point perspective. They were amazed at the 3D drawing effects that they were able to achieve. Students showed great care and control when learning to vary the value of their colouring when using pencils.















YEAR FIVE AND YEAR SIX



Year Five and Year Six have enjoyed building their skills in graphic design, learning a range of techniques including perspective, line and pattern, and value (shading). After learning a range of new skills, students were invited to apply their skills to a major artwork.

In their sculpture unit, students have made fantasy creatures including dragon eyes, using air-dry clay; as well as choosing between either a fairy house or creature plant pot.







Health & Physical Education 2021 Review Teachers - Mrs Lisa Pyle and Mr Drew Davey

This year has definitely tested our resilience; however, we are pleased to report that the students at Warragul North have triumphed. Although the year has been very disjointed, we have managed to have lots of fun and continue our learning in Health and Physical Education. We have also learned to be more grateful and enjoy being able to spend time together.

The junior grades have been fortunate to be able to attend school for the majority of the semester. Attending school has allowed them to engage in a learning program comprised of skill and knowledge development in both health and physical activity. The junior students have been introduced to and allowed to refine their kicking, running and jumping abilities while building upon their fitness.

Some of the favourite games enjoyed by our younger students are Turtle Tag, Fruit Salad and Farmer Sam. We have added a game called Hula Huts and Demo Ball to our repertoire. Both of these games have a specific focus on overarm throwing, and the improvement in the children's skill level has been extremely pleasing.

This year Warragul North Primary School staff and students were excited to be involved in The National Health and Physical Education Day for the first time. All children, including remote and on-site learners, were provided with a list of activities to engage in and healthy recipes to try. Some favourites were the banana smoothie and the scavenger hunt. Many of our families worked together to accumulate steps, share a healthy meal or test their skills in a competitive game. Although not an ideal situation, our students did manage to remain active during remote learning.
